

With five GRAMMYs, 14 Blues Foundation Awards, and a groundbreaking career spanning nearly 50 years under his belt, Keb' Mo' stands as one of the most accomplished and respected artists working in contemporary roots music. In the decades that followed his 1994 debut album, Keb' would go on to top the Billboard Blues chart seven times and perform everywhere from Carnegie Hall to the White House. 
PATTI LABELLE

MAREN MORRIS

Maren Morris is one of the leading voices in music today. Her triple platinum single "The Bones" dominated 2020, topping the Billboard Hot Country Songs chart for 19 consecutive weeks and became the first solo female multi-week #1 in country radio since 2012. The single earned Morris Song of the Year and Female Artist of the Year at the 2021 ACM Awards and Female Vocalist of the Year, Single of the Year and Song of the Year at the 2020 CMA Awards, plus and a 2021 GRAMMY[®] nomination for Best Country Song.

BILLY PORTER

Billy Porter is a GRAMMY[®], EMMY[®], and TONY[®] Award-winning singer and actor. Porter took home the EMMY[®] Award for Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series in 2019 for his work on "Pose," making history as the first openly gay man to do so. Time Magazine named him one of the "100 Most Influential People" of 2020. Billy released his memoir, "Unprotected," in October. His directorial film debut, "What If," is set to drop in 2022. Billy kicks off his next chapter in music, his first love, with a new album coming soon.

CHRIS STAPLETON

Kentucky-born Stapleton is a 5-time GRAMMY[®], 10-time CMA and 9-time ACM Award-winner and one of the country's most respected and beloved musicians. This past fall, Stapleton released his critically acclaimed new album, "Starting Over" – a record that examines life's simplest joys and most serious struggles. Released to widespread acclaim, it won Album of the Year at the 56th ACM Awards and landed on several "Best of 2020" lists, including NPR Music, Rolling Stone, Billboard, Esquire, Vulture, and The New York Times.

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U.S. ARMY BAND DOWNRANGE

The U.S. Army Band Downrange supports the men and women of the Armed Services through popular music, while reaching all audiences, young and old, with their continuously up-to-date repertoire of rock, pop, country, R & B, and inspirational signature patriotic arrangements that are popular with all listeners. THE NATIONAL TREE: A CHERISHED TRADITION

The history of the National Christmas Tree is closely intertwined with the history of America. Through peace and war, from national celebration to national mourning, Americans have gathered together and celebrated the season at this holiday event.

The first National Christmas Tree was placed on the Ellipse south of the White House in December 1923. The tree was a 48-foot Balsam fir donated by the President of Middlebury College in Vermont. At 5 p.m. on Christmas Eve, President Calvin Coolidge walked from the White House to the Ellipse to light the tree from his native state. The tree was decorated with 2,500 electric bulbs in red, white and green, donated by the Electric League of Washington. Music for this first lighting ceremony was provided by a local choir and a quartet from the U.S. Marine Band. This first National Christmas Tree led to the tradition we celebrate today, even as the tree's location and lighting ceremony have changed.

From 1924 to 1933 the tree, renamed the National Community Christmas Tree, was located in Sherman Park, south of the Treasury Building and southeast of the White House grounds. During these years, simple lighting ceremonies and community singing were accompanied by the U.S. Marine Band. The National Park Service's responsibilities for the lands and the tree ceremony began in 1933.

The years 1941 to 1953 found the National Christmas Tree on the South Lawn of the White House. In 1941, on December 24, only weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor, President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill led the lighting ceremony and addressed the crowd.

In 1954, the tree moved back to the Ellipse, where it has been located ever since. Also, in 1954, the tree lighting became known as the Christmas Pageant of Peace, a celebration conceived by the Washington Board of Trade and the

Washington Citizen's Committee.

The tree lighting ceremony moved from Christmas Eve to earlier in December and was followed by three weeks of presentations by community groups on the stage at the Ellipse.

While the actual location of the tree in President's Park has moved and the lighting ceremony program has evolved over the years, the purpose remains the same: to bring our local and national communities together to celebrate the season and share the universal message of peace during the holiday season.

In 1978, National Park Service horticulturalists searched for a perfect tree whose life had started under similar environmental conditions as those of Washington, D.C., and a tree that would be healthy and strong enough to survive a move to the Ellipse.

They found the tree in York, Pennsylvania, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Myers. It appeared to be the perfect shape and size, with no disease, and living in just the right soil. The tree had been planted by the Myers' grandchildren. After discussions with the National Park Service horticulturalists, the Myers agreed to let their tree become the nation's Christmas tree.

That tree had grown to over 42 feet, served as the National Christmas Tree for six different U.S. Presidents (Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama) and was featured in 33 annual National Christmas Tree Lighting events before being toppled by a strong wind gust on February 19, 2011.

On March 19, 2011, the National Park Service completed the planting of a new National Christmas Tree, exactly one month to the day after the previous National Christmas Tree was felled. This new National Christmas Tree was a 26-foot-tall Colorado blue spruce from a tree nursery in New Jersey.

The tree served as the National Christmas Tree for one tree lighting ceremony in December of 2011. Unfortunately, that tree died of transplant shock and was removed on May 5, 2012.

On October 27, 2012, National Park Service horticulturalists completed the planting of a new National Christmas Tree. That National Christmas Tree is a Colorado blue spruce—the same species as the previous two trees—and, just like the 1978 tree, came to the Ellipse from a private residence, this time from nearby Virginia. That tree was irreparably damaged in 2018 when an individual attempted to climb it.

A new tree was once again been planted on the Ellipse. The 30-foot Colorado blue spruce from Palmyra, Pennsylvania, played the starring role in this revered holiday tradition for two more years before being replaced by the National Park Service.

Tonight, for the first time, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. and Dr. Jill Biden will light a white fir tree, planted just a few weeks ago in its new home on the Ellipse in President's Park. That tree will once again be decorated and lit next year to mark the eagerly anticipated centennial of this beloved holiday tradition.

Christmas is always a special time in and around the White House, and the National Christmas Tree remains an internationally-recognized symbol of the festive season and a living witness to the history being made in our nation's capital.

This year's design includes a background of warm white lights with a delicate sprinkling of sparkling red and warm white sphere ornaments placed in a cascading pattern from the top all the way down the newly planted white fir tree, with a cluster of sparkling red and white spheres on the lower branches. A simple, yet elegant star topper finishes off the design.

Using the latest in LED lighting products, this is the 13th consecutive year that GE LED lights, many of them ENERGY STAR[®] certified, have been used exclusively to light the National Christmas Tree.

The National Christmas Tree is a cherished tradition, and with the advancements in LED lighting, innovative designs create new memories year after year. These advancements also offer an opportunity to utilize energy efficient and lighter weight options, helping conserve resources and preserve this living tree.

The total wattage is around 5600 watts and because the lights are GE LEDs, they use up to 80% less energy than incandescent lights. The tree will be lit from dusk until around 11:00 P.M. every night.
