DE it enalled by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States on unlaw. of America, in Congress assembled, That if any persons shall unlawfully combine or conspire together, with intent to oppose any measure or measures of the government of the United States, which are or fhall be directed by proment, &c. per authority, or to impede the operation of any law of the United States, or to intimidate or prevent any person holding a place or office in or under the government of the United States, from undertaking, performing or executing his truft or duty; and if any person or persons, with intent as aforefaid, shall counfel, advise or attempt to procure any intent coun- furrection, riot, unlawful affembly, or combi-&c. infur- nation, whether fuch conspiracy, threatening, counsel, advice, or attempt shall have the pro-Picts, Sec. poled effect or not, he or they shall be deemed guilty of a high mifdemeanor, and on conviction, before any court of the United States having jurisdiction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, and by imprisonment during a term not less than fix months nor exceeding five years; and




























BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

A Proclamation.

Atterns, on the twenty-second day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, a proclamation was issued by the President of the United States, containing, among other things, the following, to wit:

"That on the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, all persons held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States, shall be then, thenceforward, and forever, free; and the Executive government of the United States, including the military and usual authority thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of such persons, and will do no set or acts to repress such persons, or any of them, in any efforts they

Emancipation Proclamation – September 22, 1862
