The society's meeting on 8 April 2009 was a 'show & tell' of old time favourites.

Vic Boardman showed a book rules and regulations of the Camden Temperance Society which his father joined him up in 1935. He also drove his 1931 Chevrolet to the meeting

John Wrigley displayed his grandfathers gold watch which was 100 years old. It was presented to him by the members of the McLean Methodist circuit in 1909.

Frances Warner, a favourite bear. called Elvis, given to her by her guardian, Mrs Fisher. She got it from Germany. Frances has had it for 47 years

Olive McAleer showed a painting by Harry Hankie. It belonged to Rita Bloomfield a fellow painter who had painted with Olive for over 18 years. Rita left the painting to Olive on her death. Olive started painting over 39 years ago.

Karen Farmer displayed a cross stitch of John Street Camden that she completed in 2003. She also showed some framed cards of Camden that she purchased at the Camden markets.

Julie Wrigley demonstrated her bird watching binoculars. They had been stolen from her car, recovered, damaged in a fall then repaired and taken on New Zealand holiday. She says that she 'highly values them'.

Sid Long related how he came to a society meeting 30 years ago at Camden High School. He was prompted by the article about Harry Hawkey in the District Reporter. Harry has a dispute with Camden Park over a fence.

Shirley Rorke displayed some vases. A blue one from England, and a French blue and white piece and an unusual tulip vase.

Peter Hayward talked about a number of items around the theme of measurement. They included scales, a 1936 Art Deco aluminum electric clock, a thermometer, carpenters folding ruler, compass, string level, a 1891 physics book, a 1919 fob watch, and an amp meter.

Jos Ferguson showed a bronze memorial plaque of a grandparent killed in World War One (1918) who was in the 53<sup>rd</sup> Battalion. The medallion was issued by the British

Government for soldiers killed in action. They were sometimes called 'Dead Man's Penny' or 'Death Plaque'.

Roslyn Tildsley displayed off a crotchet child's jacket she had made for her niece.

Pauline Downing demonstrated the group a favorite soft toy Garfield, her favorite woolen slippers that are 'good to wear', and a wooden spoon used for making jam which she purchased at the antique shop at Fitroy

Ray Herbert showed a poster of new pre-decimal stamps from 1966 which were displayed at the Miranda post office where he worked at the time. Ray then distributed Easter eggs to all present.

Bob Gray displayed a variety of book on Scotland, the birthplace of Helen, his wife. He told the story of Waltzing Matilda which came from a Scottish folk ballad and showed off 1797 nail buffer, silver thimble and a button hook for shoes.

The society's guest speaker in February was Allen Powell from the Mt Annan Botanic Gardens. He spoke about several containers of fossilised ferns from northern NSW and a living specimen of Wollemi Pine. He described the conditions in which the ancient pine

thrived and survived in.

In March Peter Cuneo, the manager of Natural Heritage at Mt Annan Botanic Gardens presented 'Jumping the Garden Fence'. He spoke on how feral olives have spread across the Camden district. and attempts to control it. He outlined the types of vegetation that make up the Cumberland Plain Region.

The archive room continues to attract attention from researchers and visitors. In the last few months there have been family history enquiries for: Harloff; Fuller/Sheather; Gittoes; Hilder; Adamson; Menz/Pallier; Bugden; Hawes. Other general research has included: Pansy; HC Wallace the last station master; Ben Linden, Narellan; Burragorang Valley; Camden Gasworks; Camden Floods; Macaria; Aboriginal history; Mt Hunter Public School; Museum's statement of significance.

Visitor numbers to the museum between January and May have been 2,075, in April there 1.008.

The society has recently purchased computer software for the management of the museum collections. It is called Mosaic Plus. Julie Wrigley and Cathey Shepherd attended a 3 day training course in January 09.

**School visits** to the museum are supervised by Doug Barrett and he continues to do a sterling job. There were the following school visits: February, Sherwood Hills Christian School, 15 students; April, Macarthur Anglican, Year 7, 40 students; April, Magdalene College, Year 7, 130 students; May, Macarthur Anglican, Year 3, 85 students. Other groups included: May, Hawkesford Coaches, 25 visitor; June, Hawkesford Coaches, 20; Kiama Historical each of the societies.

**Grants:** The society has purchased a digital projector and screen with a successful grant application from the 2008 Volunteers Grants Program from the Federal Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs. The website continues to be busy. In the 5 months to May 2009 there have been over 55,000 hits. The busiest month was April with over 12,400 hits. There have been around 7,000 unique visitors, with 8,500 separate visits, sampling over 37,000 pages. One of the busiest pages on the website is the Camden Bibliography, which contains a large list of references about Camden.

## The History of Mt Hunter Public School, 1859-2009

## The Oaks Horse & Pony Club, 1958-1966, 1970-2009

The local history scene is the field of the keen amateur historian and these two books the enthusiasm of their authors and the people that they are represented by the stories they tell.

The school history of Mt Hunter places the village and the school in the wider context of the district history. The history of the school is the history of the village and the many families that have lived in the area and sent their children to the school. The memoirs of past staff and students provide

access to an earlier social history of the village

The history of the pony club fit that mould. They both reflect illustrates the importance of the horse in the wider context of the area. The horse has moved from an economic resource to lifestyle and recreation. This in turn represents the changes in the area from working farms to hobby farms.

> Both publications have reproduced a number of original document on the history these institutions. They provide a voice from the past, which speaks to the present.

Both histories provide a plethora of photographs that provide a snapshot of a past time. Photographs assist story telling and provide a prompt to memories of the past. Disappointingly many are not

captioned in the school history.

The local family historians will be grateful for the vast lists of names of these localities, especially in the pony club history. Unfortunately both lack an index which would greatly help the reader.

Both are great assets to the library of local publications.

## 2009 ABC RADIO **NATIONAL** REGIONAL **MUSEUMS AWARD**

Peter Mylrea keeps doing a sterling job on organising HistoryPix. There are currently around 2500 images on the website.

HistoryPix is used by members of the public, local and Sydney media, local businesses and community organisations.

In the last 3 months of 2008 there were 23,600 hist and

23,700 searches, while in the seven months from April 2008 and January 2009 there were 43,000 hits and 55,000 searches.

The HistoryPix website is accessible through the websites of Camden Historical Society and the Camden Library. Also Picture Australia.

The society provides the photographs, the images are digitised by Searchtech, the council provides the IT and online support the library staff handle the sale of photographs and set the charges.

Camden Library has produced postcards, posters and other uses of HistoryPix.

## The Camden Historical Society

## **Camden Retrospective**

## Mr George Sidman

Mr Geoge Sidman was given life membership of the NSW Country Press Association in 1947. The president said that 'Mr Sidman is a Past President, a gentleman who has rendered signal service to the Association, a foundation member of the Association and a jolly good fellow in every respect'.

Mr Sidman stated in reply that he had 'not done so much'. He further stated, 'It is characteristic of all pressmen to exercise their privileges and duties of citizenship, and in these times of controls, registration, regimentation, if not nationalism, we have big duties beyond those

which are within our own office. One of our duties of citizenship is the education of our youth... I look upon the education of our children as the most paramount interest in national circles. I am of the opinion that none of us will be satisfied until the boys and girls of our remote country districts have equal opportunity of participating in the educational facilities that are afforded to the boys and girls of the city, and other large centres of population. I look upon the education system as one of the greatest matters that confronts us, as it affects boys and girls in

the remote country districts, and is long overdue for revision. I think we have to ask ourselves as citizens to give very serious thought to that phase of a healthy educated mind in a healthy body and may we all work for that. May we see... the culmination of which would give us confidence and assurance in a full realisation that our country, our empire, and the peace of the world would be safe in the hands of our rising generation...'
